Today's Readings

Deuteronomy 34:1-12

Moses went up from the plains of Moab to Mount Nebo, to the top of Pisgah, which is opposite Jericho, and the Lord showed him the whole land: Gilead as far as Dan, all Naphtali, the land of Ephraim and Manasseh, all the land of Judah as far as the Western Sea, the Negeb, and the Plain—that is, the valley of Jericho, the city of palm trees—as far as Zoar. The Lord said to him, "This is the land of which I swore to Abraham, to Isaac, and to Jacob, saying, 'I will give it to your descendants'; I have let you see it with your eyes, but you shall not cross over there." Then Moses, the servant of the Lord, died there in the land of Moab, at the Lord's command. He was buried in a valley in the land of Moab, opposite Beth-peor, but no one knows his burial place to this day. Moses was one hundred twenty years old when he died; his sight was unimpaired and his vigor had not abated. The Israelites wept for Moses in the plains of Moab thirty days; then the period of mourning for Moses was ended. Joshua son of Nun was full of the spirit of wisdom, because Moses had laid his hands on him; and the Israelites obeyed him, doing as the Lord had commanded Moses. Never since has there arisen a prophet in Israel like Moses, whom the Lord knew face to face. He was unequaled for all the signs and wonders that the Lord sent him to perform in the land of Egypt, against Pharaoh and all his servants and his entire land, and for all the mighty deeds and all the terrifying displays of power that Moses performed in the sight of all Israel.

mortals, whether from you or from others, though we might have made demands as apostles of Christ. But we were gentle among you, like a nurse tenderly caring for her own children. So deeply do we care for you that we are determined to share with you not only the gospel of God but also our own selves, because you have become very dear to us.

When the Pharisees heard that Jesus had silenced the Sadducees, they gathered together, and one of them, a lawyer, asked him a question to test him. "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" He said to him, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind.' This is the greatest and first commandment. And a second is like it: 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself.' On these two commandments hang all the law and the prophets." Now while the Pharisees were gathered together, Jesus asked them this question: "What do you think of the Messiah? Whose son is he?" They said to him. "The son of David." He said to them. "How is it then that David by the Spirit calls him Lord, saying, 'The Lord said to my Lord, "Sit at my right hand, until I put your enemies under your feet""? If David thus calls him Lord, how can he be his son?" No one was able to give him an answer, nor from that day did anyone dare to ask him any more questions.

You yourselves know, brothers and sisters, that our coming to you was not in vain, but though we had already suffered and been shamefully mistreated at Philippi, as you know, we had courage in our God to declare to you the gospel of God in spite of great opposition. For our appeal does not spring from deceit or impure motives or trickery, but just as we have been approved by God to be entrusted with the message of the gospel, even so we speak, not to please mortals, but to please God who tests our hearts. 


myrtle, palmetto, live oak, and our marvelous marshes—and, of course, pluff mud! The following are several lines from the book:





Why the term "saunter"?

Henry David Thoreau wrote that he had met but few who understood the art of walking—"who had a genius, so to speak, for SAUNTERING"—a word, the origin of which goes back to the Middle Ages, to describe those who went around the countryside saying they were headed to the Sainte-Terre—the Holy Land. Such persons came to be known as "Saunterers." Thoreau went on to write that he could not preserve his health or spirits unless he spent hours each day "sauntering through the woods and over the hills and fields." John Muir mused that the mountains of America are "our Holy Land, and we ought to saunter through them reverently."

We are a parish of the storied and ecologically rich Sea Islands. We are also pilgrims on a journey. Join me as we saunter about our parish grounds and to the Angel Oak and back again, praying as we go—for the Holy Land and all the earth and sea and sky—and all creatures of God that dwell therein. Good morning. My name is Melvin Jenkins--better known as Bubba. I love St. John's Episcopal Church. This has always been my home. One year ago when the Anglican Church split off, and the property was returned to the Episcopal Church, we were blessed again. What an exciting time to be at St. John's Episcopal Church,.

Parishioners at St. John's have been generous in 2023 as we rebuild our finances, but we are still dependent upon the Diocese for some financial support. Our goal over the next few years is to grow our finances and be financially independent.


